




Stitch Guide







Appliqué Stitch

Start at the back of your work and bring the needle up through the background as close as possible to the edge of your appliqué [A]. Come back down through both the appliqué and the background making a small stitch [B]. Repeat a little ways away from your first stitch, all the way around.

Be consistant in both stitch length and spacing. Stitch through the center of corners to secure them down.




Blanket Stitch

The blanket stitch is used to sew two pieces of felt together to make a loose element with two sides. (Starting with a folded length of thread will let you avoid visible knots. See the URL above for a tutorial.)

Hold the two felt pieces together and make one stitch that is perpendicular to the edge. Start the second stitch [A], but do not pull the thread tight until you bring the needle up through the loop of the loose stitch [B].


Be consistant in both stitch length and spacing. Smaller stitch spacing works better around curves.



Ladder Stitch

The ladder stitch is used to close stuffed toys and attach doll limbs. It is most easily done with a curved needle, but I used a regular needle without problems.

Start at the back of your work and bring the needle up through the fabric at [A] then go back down at [B]. On the same side of the opening, bring your needle back up a little ways away from your last stitch [C]. On the opposite side of the opening, go down [D] then up again a little ways away [E]. If needed, help the edges of the fabric tuck inward as you go.



French Knot

French knots are fairly simple, but it does take a bit of practice to get a feel for how much tension to use.

Start by coming up out of your fabric where you want the knot to be [A]. Wind the thread coming out of the fabric around the tip of your needle 2 or 3 times [B]. Push the needle back down through the fabric in the same hole as before, holding the thread tight to keep it wound [C-D].
